

## Biggs Field, Texas 1 July 1946

Dear Ruby, .

Afraid we have quite a tale of woe for you...it all happened like this:

We purchased the hose (51 guage nylons) and had them pack it in two packages Helen and I each carrying one. On crossing the border the customs inspector asked Helen what she was carrying and then how many pair. Guessing offhand she said five pair. He decided to check and on opening her package found eleven pair. He would have it no other way but that she was deliberatly trying to defraud the government and made her pay a fine of \$12.00 also he confiscated the six pair she alledgedly concealled. That isn't all either. As for the remaining eleven pair they are being held for duty at the customs house .... total duty \$11.55. We did not have enough between us to pay that -- in fact Helen had to borrow some from another girl with us to pay that \$12.00 fine. I realize this all makes for pretty expensive hose --- but there you are --- where do we go from here? I guess the rest is upto you. If you want to send us the \$11.55 for the duty we will get the remaining eleven pair out and mail them to you ... also the necessary postage. I don't know what sizes remain, so you would be taking a chance on that.

We are both really very sorry for the whole thing, believe me...
it all meant a good deal of trouble and heartache for both of us.

I had five dollars remaining after I bought the hose and am giving
it to Helen to help make up partly for the money she lost on the deal.

It is my opinion that she ought to be repaid the remainder. For after all
we had nothing to gain by it all outselves and I am sure that having
been in the army yourself Ruby you will realize that \$12.00 to a girl
in the army is a lot of money. You have quite a sence of justice so
I think it is well to let you and your friends decide. If you still
want me to, I guess I can try getting you six other pair of hose. Guess
that is about all on that subject...let me know as soon as possible
cause I would very much like to see all this cleared up before we
leave. From the looks of things the required months of service will
be dropped to 18 very soon and we ought to be out by August. Also
rumors still persist about our outfit moving to Florida very soon.

It is quite hot down here and we are both getting quite tan though of course Helen has me way beat. We haven't been getting any of the big money you mentioned in your letter—though I just heard that the pay rais has just gone through and our next months pay ought to include that.

Guess that is all for now.....guess you can understand the need for an immediate reply.

Dear Ruby;

Apparently Lt. Pilzer received your letter this morning, cause she took the situation to our Legal Officer, this morning. In fact Helen and I spent the best part of this morning in his office answering questions and listening to him dictate a long letter to the El Paso Customs office, also two affidavits for our signatures in which the whole thing was explained and sworn too. In his letter to the Customs Office he also explained just how everything happened and that neither of us had the slightest intention to defraud and that in view of our ignorance of the law (we can't bring anything into the states duty-free if it is not for our own personal use--learning the hard way) they reconsider and return the \$12.00 fine to Helen also the six pair of confiscated hose. Of course there isn't any assurance that this petition would be granted. But if it is you would still have to pay the duty on the seventeen pair of hose which would be \$17.85....minus five dollars we had left from the original purchase, which I had given to Helen to partly compensate for her loss onthe deal. That would leave a total of \$12.85 plus postage you would have to send. Of course if it works out that way it would greatly improve the situation from what it is right now and I think you ought to take it cause it would be better than for you to lose the original \$35.00, which isn't a mean amount in anyone's language, I guess. Anyway just keep your fingers crossed and hope that our petition is granted. If it isn't we are of course right back where we started when I wrote you that other letter.

In any event I should very much appreciate an answer as soon as possible. Also Ruby, I think you might have written to us in reply to my letter and relieved Helen and I on the subject of any worry. Instead of writing our CO you could have suggested to us that you thought we ought to see her. We didn't think of going to anyone for help because I doubted that the situation could be helped by anyone. Tho of course both she and Col. Kuhfeld, the legal officer, were both very nice and very helpful about the whole thing.

Guess that is all on the subject.... Helen sends her

regards.
